



Securing Virginia's Aviation Future:

The Case for a Permanent and Expanded Tax Exemption



Background: Virginia Aviation Parts and Supplies Tax Exemption

- Virginia's aviation industry supports <u>147,000 jobs and \$23 billion</u> in annual economic impact, with significant growth since 2018
- The 2017 Virginia Aviation Parts Sales Tax Exemption boosted competitiveness by removing sales tax on general aviation parts and supplies
 - Sunset provision for July 2025
 - Current exemption excludes aircraft with gross takeoff weight <= 2,400 pounds
- Current proposal to expand exemption to smaller aircraft and make the exemption permanent (HB1706 & SB942)



Survey and Study Findings

\$55.6 M

Annual maintenance spend on aircraft registered in VA

\$278 M

Total maintenance spend on aircraft registered in VA from 2018-2024

Business Owners

- 81% report growth
- 63% added services
- Attract out-of-state work from NC, MD, FL, and GA

Flight Schools

- 100% rely on the exemption
- Face high maintenance costs

Aircraft Owners/ Operators

 80% would shift work out of state without the exemption

Aircraft Maintenance Technicians

- 67% see increased workloads
- Tied to the exemption's continuation

Recommendations & Call to Action



Recommendations

Permanently extend the tax exemption Expand to include smaller aircraft (≤ 2,400 lbs GTW)



Governor's New Airline Service Incentive Fund (NASIF)

Created by the Virginia General Assembly during its 2020 session. Designed to encourage establishment of new non-stop commercial service between Virginia and other markets not served by other airlines. Air carriers are eligible for up to \$250,000 per year.

Current fund balance is \$2,674,770.72. By Code, 25 percent is set aside for airports with less than 400,000 enplanements annually.

Four awards granted since 2022:


- ❖ Breeze Airways, \$179,462.35 awarded for 10 routes (ORF and RIC) in 2022
- ❖ American Airlines, \$50,000 awarded for two domestic routes (DCA) in 2023
- United Airlines, \$40,000 awarded for two international routes (IAD) in 2023
- ❖ Breeze Airways, \$130,000 awarded for eight routes (IAD, ORF and RIC) in 2024






Air Service Routes Since 2022

 - potential to provide new, more affordable services not just to major markets but to all communities across the Commonwealth.















Stafford-Warrenton-Winchester (SWW) Corridor

- Originally eight states
- Participation has grown to 33 states
- Purpose foster and frame collaboration between the states as it pertains to AAM





Legislative Initiatives

Legislative Initiatives

HB 2022/SB 948 - Aircraft Registration System Modernization

- Allows for multi-year registration
- Eliminates the use of the aircraft decal
- First adjustment to the aircraft registration fee since 1979
- Supports modernization of aircraft registration process switching to digital from manual





Legislative Initiatives


HB 1967 - Commonwealth Aviation Fund Formula Adjustment

- Modernizes state funding for Virginia's 65 public-use airports
- Updates airport classifications to more accurately reflect airport roles
- Provides for a more efficient funding distribution by the Virginia Aviation Board



- Lower tuition than other institutions
- Supported by Shenandoah Valley Regional Airport,
 Dynamic Aviation, Virginia Department of Aviation,
 Virginia Aviation Business Association, Virginia Space
 Grant Consortium






- Initiated FAA certification process in September 2023
- Program to launch in Fall 2025
- Capacity to enroll 25 to 50 students per year
- Program support to include 2 faculty and 1 lab technician
- Joined ATEC March 2024
- Partnering with Averett University, Danville

Virginia Residential Property Disclosure Act; required disclosures for buyer to beware; aircraft noise.

(<u>HB1706/SB1210</u>): Advises homebuyers to assess airport proximity and noise impacts before purchasing. Authorizes the Department of Aviation to publish online noise maps provided by localities and airports in Virginia.

Transparency for Homebuyers:

- Virginia operates as a "buyer beware" state, requiring buyers to gather information.
- Noise maps will empower buyers to make informed decisions.

Statewide Impact:

- Applies to all Virginia airports, especially significant as Dulles Airport expands operations (currently at half capacity).
- Helps mitigate future noise complaints by setting expectations for buyers in established noise zones.

Collaborative Effort:

- A compromise between Virginia Realtors and the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority.
- Unanimously endorsed by the Virginia Housing Commission.

Federal Update 1 of 2

2025 Funding for Local and State Law Enforcement and Local First Responders Transition from Drones Made By Foreign Adversaries:

- Budget items submitted by Virginia Senator Perry and Del. Krizek seek to allocate \$7.5 million for a one-time Unmanned Aircraft Trade and Replace Program, which will provide grants to state and local law enforcement, fire, and ambulance services to replace drones manufactured by foreign adversaries with compliant models.
- Eligible agencies must relinquish operable drones from foreign adversaries, with grants capped at \$25,000 per drone and funds restricted to purchasing replacements in compliance with federal law.



Federal Update 2 of 2

Michele Satterlund

- The FY25 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), signed in December 2024, includes Section 1709, which mandates a national security agency to determine if DJI and Autel drones pose a national security risk. If deemed a risk, these entities will be added to the FCC's Covered List, prohibiting new certifications and making the operation of these new drones illegal, except for already licensed equipment. If a Security Agency does not make the determination, the requirement automatically goes into effect in January 2026.
- Budget proposals, including \$7.5M by Sen. Perry and Del. Krizek, aim to establish trade and replace programs for state and local agencies, mirroring similar initiatives in Florida (\$25M), North Dakota (\$15M), and New Jersey (\$10M).
